

VISION 2030: ACCELERATING AGRIFOOD SYSTEMS TRANSFORMATION

The Global Agriculture and Food Security Program (GAFSP) is a multilateral partnership and financing platform dedicated to improving food and nutrition security in the world's poorest countries. GAFSP was launched by the G20 in the wake of the 2007–08 food price crisis. Since its inception, GAFSP has deployed more than US\$2.44 billion in grants and concessional finance to countries, producer organizations, agribusinesses, and financial intermediaries for transformative investments across the agrifood system, reaching nearly 32 million people.



What is Vision 2030?

Vision 2030 is GAFSP's bold aspiration to strengthen its contribution to the long-term sustainability and resilience of agrifood systems in the world's poorest countries in support of food and nutrition security.

At the core of this vision is GAFSP's unique value proposition as a ready-to-use, proven financing and partnership platform serving the international community. GAFSP aims to accelerate the transformation of agrifood systems in low-income countries by playing three key roles:

- **Incentive setting** — channeling support towards innovative and integrated agrifood system transformation initiatives and solutions that maximize synergies between GAFSP's cross-cutting themes, public and private institutions, and financing sources.
- **Connecting** — helping partner countries implement national strategies and commitments aligned with key multilateral initiatives by promoting multi-sector partnerships at multiple levels in the agrifood system.
- **De-risking** — building confidence for larger-scale public and private investments in transformative agrifood system policies, programs, and innovations.

To achieve its aspiration, GAFSP focuses on three strategic directions:

- Maximizing co-benefits by integrating food, climate resilience, nature, nutrition, and women's empowerment.
- Empowering more smallholders with better tools, market access, and finance.
- Catalyzing additional resources to scale up public, private, and climate finance.

Why now?

- Global hunger and food insecurity remain above pre-2015 levels with up to 720 million people facing hunger in 2024.
- Shocks such as conflict and natural disasters increasingly disrupt food production and access
- Public resources and ODA are stretched thinner than ever

What is next for Vision 2030?

Vision 2030 will guide the implementation of GAFSP's 2025-2030 Strategic Plan, which outlines key results, resource deployment, and strategic partnerships co-financing partners and global initiatives.

GAFSP has over 320 projects in the world's poorest countries, turning development assistance into food security impact.
