GAFSP overview

Launched in 2010 to fight hunger, malnutrition, and poverty through agricultural Investment

A multilateral fund that **pools donor contributions to support development projects** in sustainable agriculture, resilience, and food systems

Implements projects in the most vulnerable countries (IDA-only) in partnership with Leading Development Institutions (Regional Dev Banks, UN agencies, WBG)

The ultimate objective is to enhance smallholder livelihood, income, improve food & nutrition security

















GAFSP Governing Structure

Steering Committees

- Multistakeholder decisionmaking body of the GAFSP, responsible for setting strategic direction, overseeing operations
- Inclusive governance structure.
 members: donors, partner
 countries, civil society,
 supervising entities
- Decisions made by consensus

Coordination Unit

- GAFSP secretariat
- Liaise between the SC and other GAFSP partners and project teams, portfolio management, Resource mobilization
- Supports the work of the SC and the TAC

Technical Advisory Committee

- An independent body appointed by the GAFSP SC
- Assesses proposals in line with the criteria laid out in the Call for Call Guidelines, provides recommendations
- Members with high level of experience and technical expertise in agriculture and food security issues

Dual-Window Structure

Public investments

- Management: hosted in the WB
- Funding tools offered:
 - 1. Country grants
 - 2. Producer Organization grants
 - 3. Business Investment
 Financing (blended concessional finance deployed through "Platform-based" approach)

Private investments

- Management: led by the International Finance Corporation (IFC).
- Funding tool offered:
 - 1. Transaction-based blended concessional finance
 - 2. Advisory services

GAFSP Impact across funding tracks

\$2.5B total GAFSP Portfolio GAFSP supports 319 projects in 55 countries, targeting sustainable agriculture and food security in vulnerable areas.

• \$1.91B in public investments for 128 projects in 49 countries:

96 Country-led projects (~\$1.8B)
32 PO-led projects (~\$80M)

 Over \$700M for 190 private investments and advisory projects dedicated to agribusiness across 35 countries

Over 21 million smallholders and their families reached


— 19.2M via public sector, 2M via private sector.

GAFSP PO-led Portfolio



An overview

The PO-led grants

The PO-led grants objective is to provides funding to POs to strengthen their capacity and sustainability, to allow them to provide better services to their member farmers and more effectively deliver GAFSP program objectives at the country and regional levels.

Guiding Principles



Ownership

POs are partners, not beneficiaries.

They design and lead projects based on smallholder producers' investment priorities.



Subsidiarity

Decisions made closest to the ground deliver real impact.

Projects must show visible, farmer-level results—not just institutional improvements

Eligibility criteria

(Section 2 of the guidelines)

National/Subnational POs

- Registered legal entity in a GAFSP-eligible country
- Operates nationally or subrationally in a GAFSP-eligible country
- Members include smallholder farmers, fishers, pastoralists, indigenous people etc.
- Provides services in agriculture, food, and nutrition security
- Member-owned and governed

Regional (Multi-country) POs

- Registered in a GAFSP-eligible or IDA blend country
- Operates in ≥2 GAFSP-eligible countries (activities limited to GAFSP-eligible countries)
- Members are mainly national POs meeting national PO criteria
- Supports members via capacity building, institutional development, etc.
- •Not eligible: National POs already implementing GAFSP-funded projects
- •Ad hoc consortiums formed solely for application

Eligible Countries

National/Subnational POs:

Must be registered and operate in IDA-only countries

Regional POs: Registered in IDA only and/or IDA-blend countries (in red)

Activity Criteria for PO-led Proposals

(Section 3 of the guidelines)

Single Country Proposals

- 1. Must be implemented only in GAFSP-eligible countries
- 2. Must align with GAFSP goals and activities must support:
 - Core areas: productivity, market linkages, risk reduction, rural livelihoods, institutions
 - Cross-cutting outcomes:
 - Climate resilience (mandatory)
 - Women and girls' empowerment (mandatory)
 - Nutrition (optional)
- 3. Build PO capacity (e.g., governance, financial, technical)
- 4. Must scale up at least one **proven activity** and include an **innovative** features
- 5. If civil works/assets: Must justify with clear rationale, context-fit, and exit strategy
- 6. If advocacy: Must be aligned with project objectives and within GAFSP's mandate

Activity Criteria for PO-led Proposals

(Section 3 of the guidelines)

Regional Proposals

- 1. Activities must benefit multiple GAFSP-eligible countries
- 2. Demonstrate regional value-added (e.g., cross-border collaboration, shared challenges)
- 3. Apply subsidiarity: Preferably channel funds to national POs via sub-grants
- 4. Support same core areas and cross-cutting outcomes (as per single country Proposals)
- 5. Strengthen regional PO and member POs' institutional and operational capacity
- 6. Scale up a successful existing activity and introduce innovation
- 7. Civil works/assets: Must include rationale, context-fit, and clear exit strategy
- 8. Advocacy: Must directly support project development objectives

Sub-Grants for Regional Producer Organizations

Priority given to regional POs proposal that channel funds to national/local member POs via sub-grants and promote a decentralized implementation.

Types of Activities Funded: Technical assistance; Capacity building Infrastructure, equipment, and inputs provision

Objectives of Sub-Grants:

- Implement country/community-specific activities that support regional goals
- Address local needs of smallholders and rural actors
- Strengthen local ownership and subsidiarity
- Build capacity of national/local POs

Reporting & Oversight:

- Must comply with **SE's** procurement, fiduciary, and admin procedures
- GAFSP requires integrated reporting: one consolidated report covering all countries and activities

Role of the PO

- POs must partner with a GAFSP SE of their choice
- POs prepare the EOI and proposal (1 per PO), with SEs providing quality checks and guidance during submission
- Develop the final project design in partnership with the SE (timeline: 9–12 months)
- PO directly implement the project in partnership with the SE
- POs are encouraged as soon as possible to engage early with SEs to assess interest and suitability.

Role of Supervising Entities (SEs)

- SEs review PO requests and decide whether to partner with a PO max. 10 EOIs per SE.
- SEs provide quality assurance and guidance during EOI and full proposal stages.
- They conduct capacity assessments of POs.
- If selected, **SEs and POs co-develop** the final project.
- SEs channel funds, support implementation, and ensure compliance with their operational policies.

Nore: Different SE= Different Implementation Modalities

- **Technical Assistance SEs** (e.g. FAO, WFP): Can directly implement TA activities (e.g. training, analysis).
- Investment SEs (e.g. MDBs): Channel full grants to POs, who lead implementation.

Proposals must specify the budget share managed by SE vs. PO for each activity/component.

Available funding and funding limit

(Section 1 of the guidelines)

US\$38 million available. The final allocation amount will be decided by the technical strength of submitted proposals (only strong proposals will be financed)

The maximum amounts of funding per project are as follows:

- National POs: US\$ 2.5 million
- Regional POs that do not provide sub-grants to member national POs: US\$ 2.5 million
- Regional PO-led projects which provide subgrants to member national POs: US\$ 4 million

On an exceptional basis, higher amounts could be awarded (in exceptional cases where the applicant has extensive track record in managing larger external funds)

Two Stage Application Process

Part 1 (26 June)

Expression of Interest (EOI)

- Reviewed by CU for eligibility and completeness only
- No technical evaluation at this stage
- Eligible POs with complete EOIs invited to submit Full Proposal (Part 2)



Part 2 (11 November)

Full Proposal

- Reviewed by CU for completeness
- Assessed by TAC for technical strength
- Recommendations by the TAC to the GAFSP SC
- SC makes final funding decisions;
 CU informs applicants

- •1 proposal per PO (submitted via partner SE)
- •Up to 10 proposals per SE


Selection Criteria for National POs

Technical Strength	70%	Technical Quality – Relevance, innovation, sustainability, strong design & results Design Feasibility – Realistic, context-appropriate (esp. in FCV settings) GAFSP Alignment – Links to GAFSP goals, other initiatives, and focus on FCV areas. Links with GAFSP or SE projects represents a plus (Assessed via Full Proposal)
